2025 has been an exceptional year for the healthcare programs at Chattahoochee Valley Community College, marked by measurable growth, program expansion, and the continued success of students preparing to enter critical roles across the medical field.

In May and December, CVCC recognized its Allied Health and Nursing graduates through formal pinning and recognition ceremonies that honored both achievement and professional readiness. At the same time, the Medical Laboratory Technician program continued to strengthen its foundation, expanding access to real-world laboratory experience and supporting the growing demand for skilled diagnostic professionals.

From nursing and allied health training to hospital-based partnerships, CVCC remains focused on preparing students to take the next step into meaningful healthcare careers effectively equipped with the skills, experience, and confidence to serve their communities.

CIRSS: BRIDGING THE GAP FOR RURAL STUDENT SUCCESS

In 2025, CVCC launched the **Center to Improve Rural Student Success (CIRSS)** to expand educational access and achievement for students in rural communities. Funded through the U.S. Department of Education's Rural Postsecondary & Economic Development (RPEDS) program, CIRSS is a multi-year initiative designed to remove barriers that often limit opportunity for rural learners.

The program focuses on students in Russell, Barbour, Macon, and Bullock counties, as well as surrounding rural areas. CIRSS provides personalized advising, career coaching, and outreach to middle and high schools, helping students explore college and career pathways early. The program also supports digital access, ensuring students can connect to enrollment and learning resources online.

By combining outreach, technology, and student support, CIRSS is strengthening the bridge between rural communities and higher education. The initiative reflects CVCC's commitment to helping every student take the first step toward college, career, and lifelong success.

NEXT-STEP SUPPORT FOR EVERY PIRATE: CREATING PATHWAYS THAT MATTER

CVCC is also committed to serving those who have served our country. The College's **veteran support services** help military-affiliated students and veterans transition into college life. Assistance with benefits, guidance through academic processes, and a supportive campus community create an environment that enables veterans to focus on achieving their educational and career goals.

Equally important are the resources that address life's day-to-day challenges. Through **Pirate Pantry and Pirate Thredz**, students can access food and clothing at no cost. These services help alleviate the financial strain that often accompanies college life, enabling students to focus on their studies instead of worrying about basic needs. CVCC recognizes that success in the classroom is directly tied to stability outside it.

Together, these services form a strong network of support that extends beyond academics. They reflect CVCC's mission to meet students where they are and to provide resources that help them move forward. Whether it is tutoring, technology access, counseling, veteran services, or everyday essentials, the goal is the same: to remove obstacles so that students can succeed.

At CVCC, support is built into the student experience. By addressing academic, emotional, financial, and personal needs, the College reinforces its belief that every student should have the opportunity to achieve at the highest level.

FORMER CVCC BASEBALL STANDOUT DRAFTED BY LOS ANGELES DODGERS

Former Pirate baseball player Connor O'Neal, was selected in the 9th round of the 2025 Major League Baseball Draft by the Los Angeles Dodgers.

A native of Columbus, Georgia, O'Neal is a Northside High School graduate who played catcher for CVCC during the 2022 and 2023 seasons. Known for his leadership behind the plate and powerful presence at bat, he helped lead the Pirates to consecutive winning seasons. He established himself as one of the top junior college catchers in the region.

After graduating from CVCC, O'Neal continued his athletic and academic career at Southeastern Louisiana University, where he continued to impress scouts with his performance at the Division I level. His hard work and talent paid off when the Los Angeles Dodgers selected him as their 9th-round pick in this year's draft.

"We knew from day one he had the potential to go far, and we're incredibly proud to see him take this next step in his career," said CVCC Head Baseball Coach Hunter Vick.

O'Neal's journey from local high school standout to future Major Leaguer is a testament to the opportunities and development available at CVCC. The College congratulates him on this outstanding achievement and looks forward to watching his continued success at the professional level.



KEY HALL UPGRADED WITH NEW EQUIPMENT FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

Back in the spring, CVCC installed new workout equipment in the campus gym to better support its student-athletes. CVCC RECEIVES PRESTIGIOUS METALLICA SCHOLARS INITIATIVE GRANT

Chattahoochee Valley Community College (CVCC) is proud to announce its selection as one of 15 nationwide recipients to join Year 7 of the prestigious Metallica Scholars Initiative (MSI). Supported by a generous \$75,000 grant aimed at enhancing the following:

- Tuition assistance for up to nine credit hours will be available to students within the HVAC, industrial maintenance, advanced automotive manufacturing, and welding programs
- \$230 will additionally be provided to each student in the above-mentioned programs to help with personal equipment, examination fees, etc.
- The goal is for all 30 of the students to receive an industry-recognized credential within the applied technologies program by the completion of the grant cycle

All Within My Hands (AWMH), the non-profit, philanthropic organization created by the members and management of Metallica, recently announced its Year 7 of its Metallica Scholars Initiative (MSI) with its largest grant to date, totaling approximately \$3M. MSI now has a presence in 75 colleges across all 50 United States and the territory of Guam and is expected to reach approximately 10,000 students.

Launched in 2019 by All Within My Hands in partnership with the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC), MSI began with 10 colleges focused primarily on Manufacturing programs. The workforce initiative has since expanded to offer opportunities in diverse fields for students interested in gaining the skills and training necessary to establish meaningful careers that provide family-sustaining wages.

“2025 is a watershed moment for the Metallica Scholars Initiative,” stated Peter Delgrosso, Executive Director, All Within My Hands. “With the addition of 15 new schools this fall and USC’s independent research articulating the strength of our results, we are eager



to tackle the quantifiable shortage of skilled labor our nation faces. If we extrapolate these ROI numbers over a career, it demonstrates how effective and profitable learning a trade can

“I could not be any prouder of our Metallica Scholars. We know that our country needs millions of skilled tradespeople, and it warms my heart to know that our Foundation’s efforts are making a positive impact and putting hard-working people on the path to careers in the trades. Year 7 also marks the renewal of AWMH’s partnership with the Lowe’s Foundation, which has provided \$1 million in support as part of its five-year, \$50 million commitment to prepare 50,000 people for skilled trades careers.

It takes a village to achieve these results, including the continued support from many long-time corporate partners of AWMH, notably workwear manufacturers Carhartt, Wolverine, and CNH, a global leader in agricultural and construction equipment. The aforementioned, along with the extended Metallica Family of fans,



CVCC is officially on the road with its brand-new Commercial Driver’s License (CDL) Training Program, part of the Alabama Community College System’s (ACCS) Skills for Success initiative.

The new program offers no-cost, behind-the-wheel training for Alabama residents and workers looking to start or advance a career in commercial driving. It also provides a valuable opportunity for local employers who want to upskill their workforce and meet the region’s growing demand for skilled drivers.

“Through Skills for Success, we’re able to give our students and community members access to real, hands-on training that leads directly to good-paying jobs,” said Bobby Cook, Associate Dean of Workforce Development and CTE. “Our CDL program is designed to move people quickly from training to employment, meeting a critical need for qualified drivers in Alabama.”

The CDL training is designed to meet real employment needs throughout Alabama. Participants must have a valid CDL permit to enroll, and once completed, they’ll be ready to join Alabama’s

essential workforce of professional drivers.

In addition to CDL, Workforce development added Electrical Technology to the CTE program offerings.

The Electrical Technology program provides hands-on, industry-aligned training that prepares students for high-demand careers in residential, commercial, and industrial electrical work. With a focus on safety, technical skills, and real-world application, the program helps students gain the competencies employers are seeking while supporting the region’s growing need for skilled trades professionals.

Together, the CDL Training Program and the Electrical Technology Program demonstrate CVCC’s commitment to taking the next step in strengthening workforce pathways and creating clear, accessible opportunities for students to advance their careers. These initiatives not only support local employers but also empower individuals to gain the skills needed for long-term success in high-wage, high-demand fields.

CVCC EXPANDS STEAM INNOVATION WITH NEW AI-POWERED ROBOT DOGS

CVCC is taking another bold step in career technical education with the addition of two state-of-the-art robot dogs, funded through an Alabama Community College System Workforce STEAM Grant. The \$84,000 investment brings artificial intelligence into the

classroom and enhances programs such as Emergency Medical Services, Fire Science, Criminal Justice, Cybersecurity, and Advanced Manufacturing.

The robot dogs Ceva and Zeus, use fully programmable 360-degree LiDAR technology to scan their surroundings, create 3D maps, and move safely through real-world environments. Ceva is being used in a Computer

Information course, while both dogs made their debut at the 2025 Career Exploration Camp, where students observed how LiDAR helps them detect and respond to obstacles in real time.

With two dogs, CVCC can dedicate one to recruitment, STEAM camps, and community outreach, while the other supports academic instruction. Their presence continues to grow: Zeus is scheduled to appear at the 7th Annual Let’s Grow STEAMx Youth College & Career Expo in Columbus, Georgia, on February 10, 2026.

Together, Ceva and Zeus demonstrate CVCC’s innovative approach to AI and its commitment to preparing students for the next step in an evolving workforce.




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
Student to Faculty Ratio


Dual Enrollment Students




Student Type





LOOKING AHEAD TO THE FUTURE



Chattahoochee Valley Community College marked an important moment of transition on December 1st with the appointment of Annette Funderburk as Interim President. The announcement was made on campus by Jimmy H. Baker, Chancellor of the Alabama Community College System, signaling both continuity and a clear focus on the future.

Funderburk steps into the role following the retirement of Jackie Screws, who concluded 38 years of service to the Alabama Community College System. As CVCC moves forward, the transition reflects a natural next step, one that builds on momentum while positioning the College to respond to evolving student and workforce needs.

With a career rooted in system-level leadership, workforce development, and institutional planning, Funderburk brings a broad perspective to CVCC. Since 2018, she has served as President of J.F. Ingram State Technical College, providing correctional education and statewide career and technical education, Adult Education and GED programming, and workforce training initiatives. Her work included overseeing 19 instructional programs, strengthening business and industry partnerships, securing state and federal funding, and guiding long-range planning efforts to ensure programs remained responsive and sustainable.



Before leading Ingram State, Funderburk held several leadership roles within the ACCS, including Interim President, Director of External Affairs, and Workforce and Governmental Affairs Officer. In those positions, she worked closely with the Alabama Legislature, the Governor's Office, and state agencies, gaining valuable insight into how colleges can align education and workforce priorities to support economic growth across the state.

Funderburk holds a Master of Public Administration from Troy University and is a Certified County Administrator. Chancellor Baker noted that her depth of experience and strong

statewide relationships make her well prepared to guide CVCC during this transition period.

As Interim President, Funderburk brings a steady, forward-looking approach focused on collaboration and continuity. Her leadership supports CVCC's ongoing efforts to strengthen academic and workforce pathways, expand partnerships, and ensure students are prepared for what comes next. As the College looks ahead, her experience and perspective help set a clear course for continued progress. She and her husband, Ken, have three adult children and two grandchildren.
